Member Carli McKelvey's Horse Story

For as long as I can remember, I have wanted a horse. I did not grow up in a wealthy family, horses were (and still are) a privilege that was not necessarily within my parents' means. But that did not stop me, it only stoked an already blazing fire within me. I knew I had to use my intellect to be successful in school, to get a career with a well-paying job, one that could support dreams I would hold close to my heart. Like playing cards, quietly biding my time, I always had a long-term strategy to be successful as a horsewoman and rider.

My parents did what they could. They let me join 4-H and drove me to countless Pony Club meetings and riding lessons. Frequently I worked off lessons by cleaning tack and various other chores, so they were stranded at the barn 65 minutes from home for hours. Although horses are not their thing, they nonetheless supported me. Due to my lack of finances, I spent a considerable amount of time reading horse books -Saddle Club, Pony Pals, Thoroughbred, etc... series, encyclopedias, textbooks on dressage, course building, anatomy. You name it, if it involved a horse, I read it. Plus I am no less than a pro at internet research or, let's call it what it is, low-key stalking.

When I've been able to ride, it's mostly been on borrowed horses. With a pretty athletic, flexible body, I've gotten a lot of "has talent, needs direction" feedback. Then I had a kid and suddenly I was almost 40, I could stand it no longer. I was tired of wasting all the potential I believed I had, but never felt like I could take advantage of because of money, time, family, etc.

I made a choice, I was going to get a pony. I have always wanted a Connemara. I brought Paddy home. He was nervous, but sweet, smart, and basically untouched when I got him. Me? I was an unfit adult re-rider.

Over three years ago, I bought the first Dressage Rider Training (DRT) program. I went to work, completing the DRT2 immediately following, and then on to DRT3, DRT4, DRT High Performance Fitness (HPF), and DRT5. To this day I work out 6 days a week, using the DRT programs, and am on week 175. Honestly, I have never been fitter. It has made a world of difference in my riding. (Check out the dressageridertraining.com with Nicola Smith. Carli promises more about the program in the next issue of the Reader.)

Then over two years ago, I made the leap and messaged Kate Fleming-Kuhn on whim knowing that she had again added some school horses to the program at StarWest. I had taken a handful of longe lessons with her and Martin when I was pregnant with my daughter Charlotte. I had taken the longe lessons on schoolmaster Kelly. Around the time I was ready to come back to riding, Kelly was overburdened and that part of the program was half-halted for a bit. (This is when I brought Paddy home, but back to the present).

I keep striving to put in the work. In over two years I have gone from "has talent, needs direction" to a rider whose goals are slowly becoming more attainable. Only recently, have I even quietly, limitedly started sharing them. The continuous drive for perfection I get from Kate and Martin Kuhn, along with the positive feedback from them, and other riders and instructors at the barn and elsewhere has been incredibly sustaining and empowering. I continue to strive to improve, in every ride, in every chance to spend time with a horse on the ground or in the saddle. (continued on page 3)

Last year, Kate offered to let me take schoolmaster Wes to IceBreaker. I jumped at the chance. His owner, Deb Klamen, was so gracious to allow me to ride him. I almost jumped out of my head when Kate said I should plan to ride Third Level. Surely, I was not ready, but as in all things, I have put my entire trust in Kate. I entered Wes in Third 1, and Paddy in Training 3. On the day of the show, Kate and Martin were both super busy with other rides. I had to ride them by the seat of my pants. Luckily instinct is actually something I feel relatively confident about in the saddle. I had just taken a couple of super clinic lessons with Gerhard Politz the week before. I was able to put some lovely rides in on a spicy Wes and nervous Paddy.

I took both to Centerline Classic in June, where the real show nerves hit. I think it's because I didn't have to think so hard about how to ride the horse I was on that I let my mind focus on the fear. It is something I continued to work on at National Dressage Pony Cup with Paddy, and later at SLADS in August with Wes. Over those shows, those two helped me get one First Level and both of my Third Level scores toward the USDF Bronze Medal.

I was also fortunate enough to land a couple of "internships" with the team, grooming and braiding for a May show and the U.S. Festival of Champions, both held at Lamplight. The latter only served to fuel my fire. With Kate's input, this year I will show Luna to complete my First and Second Level scores toward the Bronze, and to show Wes at Fourth Level. Just after Christmas, I did my first one tempis, 17 of them in a row. It was so thrilling .

I maintain my Pony Club membership, and hope to take my H-A test in the next few years, as well as some of the dressage specialty certifications. In addition, this year I would like to attend the Indiana Dressage Society's offering of the USDF "L" Education Program. I have big goals. I'm "tired of being a mediocre rider" as I once said to Kate when she asked me what my goals were one cold day after a lesson. Those goals haven't changed, but I have changed to reach for them.

I am so glad Kate took a chance and agreed to teach me again, and I even brought a friend (a Connemara pony-loving friend, whose daughters had two that I very much admired when in Pony Club in the 1990s). We had met online years ago, discussing Connemara ponies, and had recently reconnected. It had been a lifelong passion that she experienced second-hand watching her daughters and then by following Connemara breeders and riders.

Since I was already planning to drive down to StarWest, I thought, well she sounds like she needs to be on a horse. I thought I could message Kate to see if any other instructors had an opening for a very beginner, adult rider. She joined me and has just celebrated two years riding with Chynna Gillman with a new pony she brought home from Park City, UT with the service of the StarWest team. In over two years of carpooling to StarWest, Pat Altorfer has become one of my dearest friends. It has been a pleasure to help her in her riding journey, to grow as a horseman and friend.

US Equestrian to Utilize Black Horse One for Licensed Official Training and Evaluation

The digital platform will allow transparency and feedback during the licensed officials application process.



Lexington, Ky. – The United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) has agreed to utilize Black Horse One (BHO) as a licensed official training and evaluation partner. This agreement, which starts in 2024, will assist US Equestrian in elevating the education and evaluation process for our licensed officials.

BHO's online platform Equestrian Hub will allow judges to watch video recordings of athlete-and-horse combinations and input a score or placing based on their observations. Their inputted scores or placings are then graded against a reference judge, or judges, to determine if they are within the acceptable range.

"We are excited to partner with Black Horse One on this important initiative," stated US Equestrian Chief Operating Officer and General Counsel Sonja Keating. "We are constantly looking for ways to evolve as a Federation, and I see this as a win-win for all involved."

Current methods of training for all types of licensed officials include traveling to a competition to apprentice or shadow a judge, completing online courses or exams, and attending clinics.

"Our licensed officials will now have a way to upskill and obtain an objective assessment remotely," stated Keating. "This is invaluable. Applicants will now receive immediate feedback on their scoring and will be able to learn at their own pace. Any opportunity we have to ensure judge applicants obtain the practical skillset to score or place a class correctly is something we must do."

The need for USEF to offer a digital evaluation program was first expressed from our dressage community, so our Licensed Officials Department will work with the Dressage Department staff, USDF and expert dressage volunteers to finalize the evaluation protocol for future U.S. FEI Dressage Judge applicants. Additionally, USDF will continue to develop and host national dressage judge licensed official education, which will also utilize Black Horse One in the future.

"While the process will begin with dressage, we are excited at the opportunity to potentially expand the video evaluation tool for other breeds and disciplines, should they be interested," stated Keating.

"We believe that Official's education is an important foundation of our sport that benefits greatly from technological advancements. It is our honor to support US Equestrian with our wide offerings and we appreciate the opportunity," states Black Horse One Chief Executive Officer Daniel Göhlen. "Aside from leading-edge software solutions for scoring, management and entries available through Equestrian Hub, BHO has always prioritized officials' education. We will assist with accessible scoring and evaluation tools for both already licensed officials who want to practice or continue their education and those who are in the process of becoming licensed. We are thrilled to collaborate with USEF to further improve our solutions."
